COURTING MURDER was his first novel and his second novel RIVER MOURN won first place in the Missouri Writers' Guild Show-Me Best Book Awards in 2014.

She also owns the original Cami, a restored '79 Camaro like Rhetta's. Sharon's hobbies include painting, fishing, photography, flower gardening, and restoring muscle cars with her son, Jeff. She is a member of the Mystery Writers of America, Sisters in Crime, the Southeast Missouri Writers' Guild, and the Missouri Writers' Guild. Sharon also spent 30 years as an Appaloosa Horse Club judge, where she was privileged to judge all over the US, Canada, Mexico and Europe. Lois continued her support of HWG for the next 28 years, no doubt proudly watching it grow.

When I learned Lois had passed, my memories of our times together in HWG began to surface. When I joined the organization after its first conference, Lois was one of the original group that I bonded with since both of us were educators. She taught third grade and loved books, as well as the writing process that produced them.


During her educational process, her excellent writing skills led her to be the recipient of the Bright Flight Award.

Arriving at the next meeting, I would sit beside Lois, and we would talk about our finds and bring each other up-to-date on our writing projects.

Over the years, Lois was often the "face" of HWG. She served for several years as the Guild secretary and then as membership chairman. Very few HWG Writing Conferences went by when she wasn't positioned at the registration table, welcoming attendees to the conference and to southeast Missouri with her true southern hospitality.

Ten years ago HWG honored her service with a lifetime membership, acknowledging her as a charter member and praising her for her consistent and long time work in the organization. We appreciate her contributions to the organization, and we will miss her.


